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What is Criminology?

The study of crime, explanations for crime and social reactions to crime.

What do Criminologists do?

Criminologists working with law enforcement take a hard look at offenders, identifying their situations and motives along with societal impacts, generational changes and other trends. They also tap into ethics, investigating why people commit crimes.

What is a diploma?

- It is a level 3 qualification which is the equivalent level of an A level.
- It is assessed slightly differently with a combination of exams and internal assessments.
- You are given two resit opportunities for your external exams.
- You have one resit opportunity for each internal assessment.
- The external exams are e-assessments (electronically assessed)

Unit 2 and 4 external assessments - 1 hour 30 minutes

Unit 1 and 3 internal assessments - 8 hour controlled assessments



Unit 1: Changing Awareness of Crime

Internal/Controlled assessment: 8 hours

- The purpose of the unit is to plan a campaign for change relating to crime...
- The focus of the unit is on **unreported crime** and the consequences of such crimes.
- **Media representation** of crime and how campaigns for change can raise awareness of unreported crimes in society.
- Apply your knowledge and understanding to a scenario an unseen assignment brief when the controlled assessment begins.



Unit 2: Criminological Theories

External examination: 1 hour 30 minutes

- This unit focuses on why people commit crime and includes a study of a range of theories of criminality
- What makes someone a serial killer, or abusive to their own families?
- How do Criminologists explain crime? How credible are these explanations?



Unit 3: Crime Scene to Courtroom

Internal/Controlled assessment: 8 hours

- The focus of Unit 3 is the **Criminal Justice System** from the identification of the crime through to the **verdict**.
- What investigative techniques are available to investigators to help to identify the culprit?
- At the end of this unit you will have gained the skills to
- review criminal cases, evaluating the evidence in the cases to determine whether the verdict is safe and just.



Unit 4: Crime and Punishment

External examination: 1 hour 30 minutes

- Apply understanding of theories and processes of bringing the accused to court.
- How and why do we punish?
- Evaluate the effectiveness of social control

- Read! Get stuck into both non-fiction and fictional crime novels to spark your interest.
